A LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Habitat for Humanity closed on one house in 2023. But please don't think of that as a failure: let me show you how it's an exercise in tremendous patience towards a much greater goal.

We knew 2023 was going to be an exceptionally busy year. We partnered with several local non-profits and community organizations to expand our reach to more potential homebuyers. These partnerships also helped us qualify for financing through a loan of New Market Tax Credits; but those credits come with an expiration date, so we had to work fast. That meant putting construction ahead of everything else-because ultimately, it means we'll be helping even more families to be able to build and buy their first home in partnership with our mission.

Going into it, we knew we were asking a lot of our staff, volunteers, and especially our partner families who are working their way through our program. We took this leap of faith because I know we can count on others to see the big picture. A focus on building rather than selling in 2023 means that in the next two years, we should be able to close on at least 26 more homes! This is only possible because we are all willing to be patient-to look beyond the optics of a year with just one home sold and to see into the future where we are able to serve more families than if we'd passed on this opportunity.

Patience in the short-term means that we'll be able to build more houses – and close on more houses – in the long-term. Our new partner families are doing their part by working through 250 hours of sweat equity, and taking coursework in finances, budgeting, insurance and home maintenance. This year-and the next two years-we've asked them to be a little more patient than usual because it ultimately means that more people will find permanent shelter by purchasing a first home through our program.

My request for patience extends to you, and to all the good people who entrust us with their financial investment in our mission. Thank you for continuing to support us and for helping us to create a stronger, safer community by building affordable homes for hardworking, low-income families. Together, we're building a better St. Louis for all of us.

It is my honor to present you with our Annual Report for 2023, which outlines how your generosity translates to affordable housing and community development throughout neighborhoods in St. Louis. Once again, thank you for sharing our vision of a world where everyone has a safe, sustainable, permanent place to call home.

7,250+ -People who called to learn more about our services and our homebuyer program. For those who were ready to take the first-step toward buying a first home, we mailed a pre-screening application to start them on their journey toward homeownership. For low-income homeowners who were interested in our minor home repair program, we provided an application for services to determine if their needs and our offerings were a match. For those who need to do a little work on their credit score before applying for our homebuyer program, we provided referrals to local credit repair resources. All other inquiries were directed to agencies better suited to help them with their needs.



23 -Houses under construction throughout the year. We partnered with other local non-profits and community organizations to build at a greater capacity this year with the long-term goal of creating as many affordable homes as funds, manpower, and time would allow.



68 -Low-income homebuyers who were helped through our Minor Home Repair Program. Whether it was fixing a ceiling fan or stabilizing a gutter, home repairs make it possible for people of modest means to continue to live safely and with dignity in their own homes.



1 -Family who closed on their Habitat Saint Louis home. In a year with so many houses under construction but not quite finished, one family took their first step towards a better life by signing up for a 30-year affordable mortgage through our loan pool, and took possession of their very own home.



100% -The amount of your donation that stays in the local economy, building homes throughout St. Louis neighborhoods when you make your gift directly to our affiliate office on Grand Blvd. in St. Louis City. Simply put, local donations given to our local office build local homes.




2023 EXPENSES AND REVENUE

NET ASSETS: 17,372,920 | SUPPORT & REVENUE: \$4,940,942 | EXPENSES: \$5,825,537


Year ended December 31, 2023 = \$4,940,942




